Master Facilities Plan:

Where Things Currently Stand

Over the last several months, the Master Facilities Planning Committee studied options for the renovation, remodeling, or rebuilding of the schools in the Cuyahoga Falls City Schools District. Led by a team from *Then Design Architect* group and *Hammond Construction*, the regional representative for the Ohio Facilities Construction Commission (OFCC), the Committee was charged with determining what plan would provide the optimal learning environment for our students. To assist in the planning process, the Committee toured current buildings in the District while reviewing the assessment for each facility. Additionally, the Committee toured recently constructed buildings in North Ridgeville City School and North Olmsted City School Districts.

After much discussion, the Committee determined that it would be financially and educationally sound to build a building on the Bolich/ Newberry campus to house the District's 6th- through 12th-grade students. Currently, the sequence of construction would be:

- Demo Newberry Elementary
- Relocate Laybourne Field and construct a new 5,000-seat stadium to house football, soccer, and track
- Construct the 6th- through 8th-grade portion of the building
- Move students from Roberts Middle School and Bolich Middle School into the newly constructed portion of the facility

- Demo the current Bolich Middle School
- Construct the 9th- through 12th-grade portion of the new facility complete with a new 1,400 seat auditorium with a 200 seat "black box"
- Move the students into the new facility

These steps would be considered Segment One of a two segment Master Facilities Plan. It is important to note the current Cuyahoga Falls High School as well as Roberts Middle School would remain and be used as "swing space" while the Committee reconvenes to discuss Segment Two which will address the District's Kindergarten through 5th-grade students. The discussions surrounding Segment Two will likely take place as Segment One moves closer to completion. It is also important to note that no decisions regarding Segment Two have been made.

To determine the millage rate, the District will be in consultation with our Bond Counsel, Underwriter, and County Fiscal Officers. Further, the OFCC requires the addition of one half mill to be deposited into a maintenance fund for the new facility. And, the Board of Education is in discussion about additional operating millage. All financial information will be shared at the end of July and is based upon OFCC and Board decisions.


Bolich Gives Back: Students "Make an Impact!"

On May 17, 536 students from Bolich Middle School made an impact in their community! For the third year, students participated in the *Bolich Gives Back Day*. They did some spring planting at local retirement homes, they cleaned up litter and debris from various parks around the City, they visited fire stations and washed trucks and helped clean out their garage bays, they volunteered at a number of animal shelters. These are just a few of the 21 projects that the students from Bolich participated in throughout the day. Between teachers, faculty, and students, 594 total people were involved in amassing 1,188 hours of community service in just one day!

The *Bolich Gives Back Day* is inspired by President George H.W. Bush who was the founder of *Points of Light*. This organization believes in creating a society where it is easy to take action by strengthening existing networks, creating pervasive calls to act, and advocate for infrastructure. According to the *Points of Light* website, "Now more than ever, people are looking within themselves to find the inspiration, creativity, and sustained energy to make change. The key to unlocking the light within us is to ensure that people feel empowered to act on their unique desire to stand up and say, 'I can help.'"

CFHS 2019 Graduates: Another Million Dollar Class!



Over the past few years we have been highlighting the amazing graduating classes from CFHS. This year is no different! Our students (reported) have earned over \$1.36 million in scholarships! Besides the various places of higher-education that awarded some of our students with these scholarships, there are a number of local organizations that have also contributed to this million dollar class. The CFSFAA alone presented our students with 75 scholarships totaling \$185,000! Some of the other organizations that support our schools include the Black Tiger Gridiron Club that presented five scholarships totaling \$7,000; the Cuyahoga Falls Chamber of Commerce presented two \$1,500 scholarships to CFHS grads; the PTA awarded 29 Scholarships totaling \$17,000; the Cuyahoga Falls Rotary Club presented four scholarships valued at \$7,500 to our students.

Based on the information available at the time of printing, 200 of our grads are enrolled in either a two- or four-year university or trade school, 19 have enlisted into the military, and 87 have entered the workforce right out of high school. Forty students received Academic Honors Diplomas, eight earned Career Tech Honors Diplomas, and two earned Art Honors Diplomas. Students took 225 Advanced Placement exams and, have already earned 849.5 post-secondary credits by taking college credit plus classes. Many more students have earned Industry Credentials as a result of their *Six-District Educational Compact* programs. In all, CFHS graduating seniors academic success could translate to \$1.97 million.

Another successful year for the CFHS graduates! Congratulations to all of the Class of 2019! We look forward to hearing about all of the amazing things you will accomplish in your bright futures!

In 2014, Wallis partnered with CFHS in helping develop the *Art*, *Media & Design* den.

Throughout her career Wallis has presented ballets at the John F. Kennedy Center for Performing Arts in Washington D.C., founded scholarships for African American dancers, and collaborates with Akron Children's Concert Society to present programming to local preschool children exposing them to music and dance. In 2015, she moved *Ballet in the City* to Cuyahoga Falls and loves giving back to the Cuyahoga Falls community.
